"How to Make a Short Man Tall" Luke 19:1-10

C.I.T.—Jesus wanted to extend His grace to Zacchaeus.

C.I.S.—Jesus wants to extend His grace to you.

Purpose—I want people to accept His grace in their lives.

Introduction—Ephesians 2:8-9—Grace and faith

- I. A Receptive Heart
 - a. Setting—Jesus traveling through Jericho
 - b. Zacchaeus—His description
 - i. Jew—Jewish Name
 - ii. Chief Tax Collector
 - 1. Roman would employ local citizens to collect taxes.
 - 2. In this case, he seemed to be a manager of multiple tax collectors within the city of Jericho
 - iii. Rich
 - 1. He would have benefited from the subordinate tax collectors.
 - 2. They were notorious for preying upon their fellow countrymen to make themselves wealthy.
 - 3. Typically, the rich were viewed negatively in the Bible and society
 - c. Zacchaeus—His determination
 - i. Seeking to see who Jesus was
 - 1. Desire and intentionality
 - 2. He had heard stories of Jesus, possibly the story of the healing of the blind beggar.
 - 3. He wanted to see this famous person.
 - But it was more—to see has a literal and a figurative meaning—to know or understand
 - 5. Others wanted to see Jesus for his fame or for his miracle working, but Zacchaeus wanted to see Jesus to see who He was.
 - ii. The Crowd provided an obstacle
 - 1. Short—could refer to his stature.
 - 2. Rich people can find a way to get good seats.
 - 3. It could have referred to his status.
 - 4. Jews hated tax collectors, they were viewed as traitors and the scum of the earth, as sinners.
 - 5. It could have been that the crowd would not let him see Jesus.
 - iii. He demeans himself to see Jesus.
 - 1. Runs—wealthy men did not run, period, that is why when the father runs to embrace the prodigal son, it would have been scandalous.
 - 2. If they don't run, they sure don't climb up into trees.
 - iv. Zacchaeus was determined to see Jesus no matter what.
 - d. Zacchaeus—His delight
 - i. Jesus is surrounded by a crowd of followers.
 - ii. But he stops at only one man, Zacchaeus.
 - iii. He calls only one man's name, Zacchaeus.
 - e. Illus.—Parable of the Sower—only the receptive
 - f. Application
 - i. Why are you here today?
 - ii. Are you looking to see Jesus?
 - iii. Have you already decided to reject Jesus?

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- iv. You will get out of today what you expect.
- g. You must have a receptive heart to receive grace.

II. A Responsive Heart

- a. Jesus calls Him by name.
 - i. Zacchaeus wanted to "see" Jesus, but Jesus "saw" him first.
 - ii. This reveals a previous knowledge that Jesus had about Zacchaeus.
 - iii. Do you think he knew Zacchaeus was a chief tax collector? A rich man? A "sinner?"
 - iv. I believe he knew all those things, and yet, he still came to the tree.
- b. Jesus calls Him to relationship.
 - i. It is necessary...--Divine necessity, action in line with the Divine will of God.
 - ii. For me to abide/dwell
 - 1. Literally he was coming to eat and to spend the night with Zacchaeus
 - 2. Figuratively, when one person had a meal with another and spent the night, a relationship existed.
 - iii. Jesus was inviting Zacchaeus into a relationship with Himself.
- c. Zacchaeus obeyed.
 - i. He came down quickly, enthusiastically.
 - ii. He welcomed-accepted Jesus' invitation
 - iii. With rejoicing—a word used in the context of the emotional response to salvation.
- d. Illus.—Rev 3:20—I stand at the door and knock
- e. Application
 - i. The Holy Spirit is "knocking" on the door of your heart.
 - ii. You must decide to answer it or not
 - iii. Receiving grace hinges on your response
- f. You must have a responsive heart to obtain grace from God.

III. A Redeemed Heart

- a. The spiritual leaders grumbled about Jesus fellowshipping with a "sinner."
 - i. They were bashing the character of Jesus and Zacchaeus.
 - ii. He didn't fit their model of righteousness and value in society.
 - iii. Jesus didn't care about his status in society, he cared about his heart.
- b. Zacchaeus proved his status.
 - i. He stood up proudly, as opposed to climbing a tree—his status had changed
 - ii. He revealed that he had a changed heart by his charity and undoing the sinfulness he had done.
 - iii. A short man had been made tall.
- c. Jesus proved his status.
 - i. This is exactly what Jesus wanted.
 - ii. Salvation had come.
 - iii. He came to save the lost and dying.
- d. Illus.—Gerasene Demoniac
- e. Application
 - i. When we respond to His grace with faith, Jesus does a miracle.
 - ii. In fact, this is Jesus' priority: to change lives through extending grace.
- f. When your heart is receptive and responsive, it will be redeemed.

Conclusion

Romans 6:23

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- We must receive the gift of eternal life.
- The only things keeping grace out is you.
- Is your heart receptive/responsive?
- Will you pray with me?

Ephesians 2:8 For you are saved by grace through faith, and this is not from yourselves; it is God's gift⁹ not from works, so that no one can boast. (Eph. 2:8 CSB17)

Revelation 3:20 See! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me. (Rev. 3:20 CSB17)
